Following Up

- A <u>thank-you</u> card can make all the difference when employers are choosing between you and another candidate.
 - · A hand-written card is best.
 - Personally thank each of your interviewers for their time.
 - Reiterate your interest in the position.
 - Repeat the <u>qualifications</u> you have that match the job requirements.
- Know the hiring <u>timeline</u> and ask when you should expect to hear from the hiring manager again.
- If you haven't heard back in the <u>allotted</u> time, write a short note reiterating your interest.

Compensation

- Go <u>online</u> and research pay ranges for similar positions.
- Base your research on the <u>city</u> your position is located in.
- Minimum wage <u>varies</u> as well. It is the minimum an employer is required to pay their employee.
- o Be prepared to talk money.
- Being <u>transparent</u> with your new employer now is vital to your <u>happiness</u> down the road.
- Salaried vs. Hourly
 - Hourly rate pay is <u>determined</u> by the number of <u>hours</u> worked.
 - In the U.S., typically, if you work more than 40 hours in a week, you'll receive overtime.
 - In Canada, overtime pay for hourly workers is an average of <u>44</u> hours per week.
 - Salaried wages are divided <u>equally</u> between pay periods with the employee receiving the <u>same</u> amount each paycheck.
- You can always ask for a <u>raise</u> later. It's not all about the <u>money</u>.
- Compensation is more than just a <u>wage</u> benefits like health <u>insurance</u>, a <u>retirement</u> plan, and education reimbursement could be included.
- Two online resources for salary information: <u>Salary.com</u> and Glassdoor.com.

Prep for Your Career

- o For your first day on the job:
 - Pick out an <u>outfit</u> that looks put together, professional, and is appropriate for the environment.

- Compose a portfolio or <u>notebook</u> with official documents that HR will need, including identification and a voided check.
- Allow yourself enough <u>time</u> to arrive 15 minutes early, and account for possible traffic.
- Know where to <u>park</u>, what door to enter, and who you are <u>meeting</u> upon arrival.
- Be on your A-game and bring a <u>positive</u> attitude on day one.
- Don't be attached to your <u>cell phone</u> while you're on the job.
- Ask thoughtful questions throughout the day.
- Learn your co-workers' names as soon as possible.
- o For your first paycheck:
 - Initially, you will fill out a <u>W-4</u> in the U.S. or a <u>TD-1</u> Personal Tax Credits Return in Canada. These are how federal taxes are withheld.
 - What you bring <u>home</u> is not the same as what you're paid.
 - Two types of income:
 - Gross Pay what you've <u>earned</u> during the pay period based on your salary or hourly rate.
 - Then, a percentage of your pay will be deducted to pay <u>federal</u> income taxes, another will be deducted to pay <u>state</u> income taxes, and still another will be deducted to pay <u>local</u> income taxes.
 - Tax for Federal Programs
 - o US 6.2% is withheld for <u>Social</u> <u>Security</u> and 1.45% is withheld for <u>Medicare</u>.
 - o Canada <u>4.95</u>% is withheld for the Canada Pension Plan (CPP)
 - Withholdings vary from job to job and can include insurance, <u>retirement</u>, and charity.
 - Net Pay amount you receive for the pay period, after the withholdings.
